

The Organ is in a bad wav!

Its action is arthritic. its bellows are wheezing and many of its pipes are broken! It is such hard work to play that the organists are beginning to feel the same!

We all like to hear the organ for special events like weddings or funerals, but it can also support

choral and other kinds of music, and it can be a focus for music making in Orwell.

To repair its 888 pipes, replace its worn out mechanisms, renew its leaking bellows and make it a really good resource for future generations will cost £60,000.




Some pipes are held together with tape.

The organ was built in 1878 by the firm of T.S. Jones of Islington, for Baldock Methodist Church. Local organ builder, David Miller, assisted by members of the congregation, moved it to St Andrew's in 1988. They had to leave behind the huge Pedal pipes, but replaced them with smaller pipes, with the necessary mechanisms, taken from a different organ. The bellows leather was patched and worn parts were repaired, but the heart of the organ remained original.

During the last 33 years the pipes have been tuned regularly and dust has been cleaned from exposed surfaces, but now much of the organ is worn out and broken. Most of it has served for 143 years, and the second-hand electric components, already 30 years old when they were used in 1988, are now failing.

The bellows needs to be re-made with new leather. Broken pipes that are held together with sticky tape need to be repaired. The action connecting the keys to the pipes, was never very good and it will be better and cheaper to replace it with entirely new components. The soundboards, which are the heart of the organ's mechanism, need all the valves replacing and all the moving parts overhauling.

To achieve all this, the organ will be completely dismantled and taken to the organ builders' workshop for an estimated 8 months of work.

The up to date system that will operate the keyboard and stop mechanisms includes facilities to make the organ much easier to play and control which will be a great encouragement to future generations of organists.



Running repairs over the years have left a confusing tangle of wires. Many of the magnets controlling the pedal pipes are corroded and some have seized up.
